Finding rest and refreshment

Revd Lore Chumbley writes:

Over the summer Colin and I spent a few days in the seaside town of Sidmouth. By chance our visit coincided with the Sidmouth Folk Festival, which spills into the streets for a week in August. Everywhere we went, we heard the tinkle of morris dancers. We counted 18 troupes and there were probably some we missed. We both have a soft spot for morris dancing. It's popular with individualists and eccentrics and all the better for that. It's a distinctively English activity dating back to the 15th century, and enthusiasts spend time together practising the steps and moves so that an experienced troupe can perform in a state of relaxed attentiveness. The discipline and structure of the dance becomes a source of refreshment and recreation.

For many of us the summer will have provided a chance for holidays and refreshment – people have told me of their experiences over the summer camping, singing, making sand castles, gardening, travelling, walking, or just sitting in the sun during the heatwave, taking a few minutes to do nothing very much.

Refreshment and recreation are a human need. The Jewish sabbath was set apart as a day of rest because mentally, physically and spiritually we need to pause and let our minds freewheel. Holidays are precious but actually we don't need to spend a lot of money and energy travelling in order to experience the benefits of rest and relaxation. Hobbies involving the hands such as silversmithing or cabinet-making and repetitive activities like singing, walking or drawing often seem to free the mind from the incessant chatter of our internal monologue.

The late Una Kroll – doctor, missionary and one of the first women to be ordained in the Anglican church – suggested taking a minute or two several times a day consciously to pray – to close our eyes and plunge deep into the depths, into our consciousness or self or soul. That place where we can simply *be* was for Una Kroll always dark green. In those depths we are in the presence of God, the source of all refreshment and recreation.



For many of us, summer was the opportunity for a holiday, but do we need to travel in order to experience rest, relaxation and refreshment?

Circuit of Bath Walk for Julian House

This year's Circuit of Bath Walk, in aid of Julian House, takes place on Sunday 23 September. The circular route around the outskirts of the city has been carefully selected so that you can enjoy the beautiful countryside and spectacular views across Bath.

The whole route is 20 miles, but it's broken up into five sections and you can do as many or as few of them as you like. Most sections are between four and five miles, although one (Newbridge Park & Ride to Kingswood Upper Sports Pavilion) is just two-and-a-half



miles. The terrain is mixed - well-used paths and public rights of way, limited sections of roadway, flat fields, through to hills. One stretch, from Bathampton Mill to the Canal Centre at Limpley Stoke, follows the canal path, making it ideal for family groups with buggies. Other parts of the route take in villages such as Newton St Loe, Upper Swainswick, Englishcombe and South Stoke. Dogs, on leads, are very welcome. There is a shuttle bus around the five checkpoints during the day, so you can get back to your starting point if you choose a shorter walk.

If you plan to walk the whole route, an early start is recommended; the checkpoints will be staffed from 8am to 6pm. Water will be available at all checkpoints, plus tea and a few items of confectionery at some of them. There are places you can buy lunch along the way, or bring a packed lunch and enjoy it in the beautiful scenery.

The event is free to enter but participants are asked to raise as much sponsorship as they can so that Julian House can continue to help and support homeless and marginalised men and women.

Bishop's Message for September

A safer church for all



From the Rt Revd Peter Hancock, Bishop of Bath and Wells

Two years ago I was asked by the two Archbishops to become the lead bishop for safeguarding for the Church of England. This is a responsibility I undertake alongside my ministry as Bishop of Bath and Wells.

I was therefore much involved with the July's General Synod, which once again had an important focus on safeguarding. During the debates I spoke about the Church's journey of safeguarding; our history (with many shameful episodes), our present (a commitment to improve but a work in progress) and our hopes for the future (ensuring the Church is a safe and welcoming place for all).

I have been asked on more than one occasion whether the role of safeguarding bishop should fall to a bishop who already has responsibility for a diocese and my answer is always an emphatic "yes". Since 2016 I may have been the

face of the Church of England on safeguarding matters, but providing a safer church for all is the responsibility of every one of us, and I believe that my connection with life in the parishes is essential to my national role.

In our diocese we have a first-rate safeguarding team who are supporting the hugely dedicated people in our parishes who are playing their part to ensure our churches are the place of safety they should be. I am deeply grateful for all that they do and it will be an honour this month to preside over a service in Wells Cathedral which recognises the particular contribution and commitment of all our Parish Safeguarding Officers.

I have said we must own the responsibility of safeguarding in every diocese and in every Cathedral, parish and chaplaincy, and this is a group of individuals who has taken this responsibility to heart and is acting to deliver it. They deserve our thanks. The service will be at 2pm on Saturday 29 September and everyone is welcome to come to show their support for this important work of safeguarding children and vulnerable adults.

The church has acknowledged and apologised to survivors of churchrelated abuse and has reiterated its commitment to address and learn from the failings of the past. However, it is in the courage and grace of the survivors I have met along with the commitment of all individuals in the parishes where I find the hope for the future as we strive together to make the Church a safer place for all.

The refuge is located at a confidential address in Bath, providing comfortable, safe and secure accommodation. Women can self refer or come via an agency such as the Police, Housing, Social Services, or health professionals.

About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the normal Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our



robed choir and organist. There is the option of separate activities for children in Junior Church groups during our 10am Sunday service.

As well as worship on Sunday and Thursday mornings, there are many other activities going on in our community. We support the Genesis Sunday Centre and have our own community café. The musical tradition of the church continues to thrive, and we have an active choir; new singers of all ages are always very welcome. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting.
