Being Resurrection people

From the priest-in-charge...

Revd Lore Chumbley writes:

We are past midsummer now and should be starting the decline into Autumn, and yet as we begin to emerge from lockdown instead it feels like an awakening, a new beginning. I am not alone in feeling this. Christopher Cocksworth, Bishop of Coventry, likened the lifting of lockdown to the Resurrection. "It was as if we had been plunged into a sort of Holy Saturday existence... and now we are called to renewal, to resurrection, to keep moving with the purposes of God fulfilled in Jesus."

How might this new life be different? Christ Church has been asked to host a workshop on "Theology after the Pandemic" (on Saturday 20 October, if you are interested in coming). A recent issue of the *Church Times* asked "What are the lessons of the pandemic?" and invited ten prominent thinkers to respond. In Christ Church the pandemic has encouraged some of us to meet regularly (though virtually) for morning prayer, and the Pilgrim Group has become a weekly rather than a fortnightly event.

Out of our Pilgrim Group emerged the thoughtful question "How do we live as Resurrection people?" After all, however unexpected, that is the joyful reality of who we are. For the last 2,000 years Christians have met every Sunday to celebrate the Resurrection. Today we call it "going to church". Would it make a difference if we spoke of "celebrating the Resurrection" instead? Because the blessings of the Resurrection are literally infinite – eternal life to be lived now

in continuity with our future resurrection life; the forgiveness of sins, both ours and those of other people; the incalculable value of every part of the world in a redeemed creation.

The contributors to the Church Times hoped the pandemic would strengthen lay leadership, shock the country into a more equitable division of wealth and power, embed the use of digital media in our churches as an adjunct for communication and worship, encourage nations to work together for the health and wellbeing of the people of the world, and strengthen local communities. As we are enabled to return to our buildings, we in Christ Church are particularly blessed because the building work we have been planning for so long has taken place and we will be returning to a space that has been physically transformed. The Resurrection is both bodily and spiritual. Let's make our return to the church building the beginning of a genuine, prayerful consideration of what it means for us and for our community to be Resurrection people.



Andrew Sillett RIP

Andrew Sillett died peacefully on Tuesday 16 June in Musgrove Park Hospital. Andrew was a joyful, generous man with a big heart, and he will be greatly missed.

Andrew married Angela Berners-Wilson on 19 May 1984, which means they have just celebrated 36 years of marriage. When Angela was appointed chaplain to the University of Bath in May 2004, they made Christ Church their home church, and Andrew played an active part in church life, including serving as one of our Deanery Synod representatives. Many will remember him cheerfully marshalling traffic in our car park in all weathers, wearing a high-vis jacket and an alwayswelcoming smile.

After 12 years with us, when Angela took up her new appointment as Rector of the Quantock Towers benefice in July 2016, she and Andrew moved away to rural Somerset. For Andrew the move meant even greater involvement in his passion for steam railways

as a volunteer with the West Somerset Railway, a heritage railway with two stations within the benefice. They had planned to retire eventually to their house in Bristol, but it was not to be.

There have been numerous tributes to Andrew from his many friends on the WSR. One called him "one of life's great gentlemen". Another wrote that he was "a great character guaranteed to bring a smile to your face, always cheerful and always somebody who would brighten your day." A private family funeral took place in the last week of June but Andrew's fellow railway volunteers report that "Angela will be planning at a later date a party in accordance with his wishes for all of his friends to celebrate his life. Anybody who knew Andrew will understand he would want people to be happy and enjoy themselves rather than mourn his passing."

We send our condolences and prayers to Angela and all their friends.

Listening Chaplaincy phoneline suspended

With the opening-up of several parts of society, including increasingly greater access to places of worship, the organisers of the Listening Chaplaincy Phoneline have decided to suspend the service.

The phoneline, run by 90 lay and clergy chaplains, was set up to provide faith-based emotional support to anyone in Avon and Somerset suffering Covid-19 related anxiety.

It took just one month to develop the service and train team members, and it operated successfully for two months. Not all the calls received were linked directly to Covid-19, but many were in response to the impact of the crisis on people. The organisers also commented,"It is now known that the faith communities can respond to crisis in a different and extended way, meaning, for example, a victim support line could be speedily established in the wake of a major emergency incident."

Every weekday morning at 8am a group of us are saying Morning Prayer together on Zoom, or you can phone in. If you would like an invitation, please e-mail Lore.

The Pilgrim Group has just started reading I John, a letter apparently written by the community around John the Evangelist. Peter and Beryl Bowes are leading this, and it's open to all, every Thursday in July at 7.30pm. We will take a break for August before starting again in September.

I knew Penny Edwards since 1977, when she came to be assistant at Coningsby and Tattershall Churches in Lincolnshire. Then, I don't think the church knew what to do with women workers, but she soon got known for her love and care, took good funeral and baptism services and started a Youth Club for younger people in the local school.

After a couple of years, she moved on and lived in a village in Nottinghamshire with her friend. They remained our family friends and spent many weekends with us and our six sons in Tattershall. She always told our sons that she wanted them to be her pall bearers! Years later Penny moved to my hometown of Bath to work for a trust in a care home. She also started to attend Christ Church (my grandfather's and father's old church).

Penny was a member of the Guild of Our Lady of Walsingham in the Mid Lincs parish and, although unable to attend meetings, always received the Walsingham Review. (When she was in the parish here, we often used to go to Walsingham on day pilgrimages. Penny and I could tell a lovely story about a thunderstorm at Sandringham, which still made us laugh.)

Penny and I kept in frequent touch, when I visited my sister in Timsbury and also by phone, so it was a complete shock when she missed ringing me on my birthday. I tried to ring her but found her number disconnected.

Penny, you were a good and loyal friend for 43 years, and your faith never waned. May you rest in peace and rise in glory.

Bishop's Message for July

Building a sustainable and hopeful future



From the Rt Revd Peter Hancock, Bishop of Bath and Wells

One impact of the Coronavirus pandemic is there is now a lot of talk about the need to change and to re-imagine society, in order to build a sustainable and hopeful future. This is to be welcomed. However, change is something that we always have to live with. The Greek philosopher Heraclitus, writing some 500 years before Christ, was a great proponent of this. He is known for saying that "There is nothing permanent except change" and that you cannot step into the same river twice. By this he meant that just as the river flows so that you cannot touch the same water twice, so no two situations

are exactly the same, and the world is constantly changing.

We live in a time of extraordinary change. Self-driving transport is now practical, not just for cars, but also perhaps more alarmingly for ships and aircraft. Artificial Intelligence is opening amazing new possibilities, and medicine is advancing rapidly as the decoding of the human genome increases our understanding of many diseases. At the same time, our world groans under the weight of lifestyles and exploitation of resources which are not sustainable. I am writing this on World Environment Day, and it is becoming increasingly clear that we need to change the way we live before we wreak even more havoc on the world which God has given us to steward and care for.

But in looking for change we need perhaps to look in rather than out. I remember once reading someone saving "You can't change what is going on around you until you start changing what's going on within you." Or as Tolstoy put it: "Everyone thinks of changing the world, but no one thinks of changing himself." It is sometimes said that if we change the way we look at things, the things we look at change. There may be some truth in that, and perhaps we need to use this time of lockdown to continue to reflect on what it means to look at the world through God's eyes and to live faithfully in God's world so that we all play our part in building a sustainable and hopeful future.

About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the normal Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our



robed choir and organist. There is the option of separate activities for children in Junior Church groups during our 10am Sunday service.

As well as worship on Sunday and Thursday mornings, there are many other activities going on in our community. We have our own weekly community café every Friday. The musical tradition of the church continues to thrive, and we have an active choir: new singers of all ages are always very welcome. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting.
