
Threads through Creation



Bath Abbey is hosting "Threads through Creation", a stunning exhibition of 12 enormous embroidered silk panels that explore the story of Creation. Inspired by Genesis, textile artist Jacqui Parkinson re-imagines this ancient story in a vibrant combination of layers of silk, hand-dyed materials, metallic leathers and gold leaf, miles of thread - and more than eight million stitches. Ringing in the changes

A set of church bells from St Peter and St Paul's, North Curry, Somerset, are the first to be cast with the new cypher of King Charles III. The community raised £150,000 for the bells to be recast and some visited the foundry - John Taylor & Co., Loughborough - to witness the recasting, including the church's vicar, Revd Simon Bale. He says: "To see the bells actually poured into the cast is quite something. It's quite emotional, frankly. I was able to say a prayer of thanksgiving and of hope and gratitude as well for all this being done." The bells won't return to Somerset until later in the year.



Holy Land fundraiser at Christ Church

A fascinating illustrated talk on the book Nine Quarters of Jerusalem by its author Matthew Teller takes place at Christ Church on Tuesday 14 March starting at 6pm. Included in the ticket price of £25 is a delicious buffet mezze of Middle Eastern food with wine and soft drinks. You can buy a copy of Matthew's book and he will sign it for you if you wish. Jonathan Dimbleby, author and broadcaster, says: "What a good book this is - a refreshing portrait of the Holy City that is vibrant and engaging".

Books, cards, olive wood and Holy Land products will also be on sale. All proceeds from the evening will go to support the Spafford Children's Center in Jerusalem's Old City, which Matthew visited in the course of writing his book.

This Center was founded almost 100 years ago by an American named Bertha Spafford Vester. It first served as a hospital for children but since 1970 has refocused towards providing vitally needed therapies for vulnerable children with learning disabilities, emotional disorders and traumatic stress. Educationally



deprived women also get help to improve their confidence and self-esteem. Specialists at the Center help about 500 to 1,000 families a year from East Jerusalem and surrounding towns. Funding this work annually is a huge challenge and help is badly needed. Join us at the event and meet members of the founding family who continue to actively support the Spafford Children's Center. Shared local ministry

What does ministry look like where you are? Does it look the same as it did five years ago? The Diocese of Bath and Wells has been encouraging the bubbling up of a variety of ministries - lay and ordained - as we seek to release the gifts of all and, in the process, help to give life to the Church.

Suse Osmond, Vicar of St Mary's, Bridgwater, says: "Everybody has a gift to bring to their church, and when people are encouraged to use those gifts, that's when church works best. There are a million and one things that I am not gifted with and I welcome those with the gifts to support me - we all need others to support us."

In St Mary's, Suse has been challenging the perception that only the vicar can lead worship by asking others to lead Café Church worship, think of creative ways to pray or develop a theme for a particular service. Those blessed with other gifts are also recognised, including café volunteers, who offer pastoral care and not just a hot drink, and a church member with a passion for positive mental health who is being encouraged to explore ways the church can offer a combination of mental health and spiritual support.

Bishop's Message for February

A better way

Culture, it's said, is "how things get done around here". This suggests that our understanding of the world is largely formed by our experiences and what we're accustomed to. That's all fine until everything around us, as it does, keeps on changing. We're then set on a collision course between how we think things should be, and how they actually are. Anybody aged over 40 who's had to ask a nine-year-old how to use their new phone will understand this dilemma perfectly.

Cultural collisions aren't just restricted to technology. They affect churches too. Many of us grew up with a model of church set up by the Victorians. This mostly meant that each parish had one church building with its own vicar, who took responsibility for most aspects of the ministry needed in a particular place. Yet even this was new in its day. Look much further back and things worked very differently. The New Testament speaks of churches where lots of

different people played many different roles, each operating out of the particular skills and gifts given them by God. In Ephesians the writer describes a church where "some [are] apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers".

So what would be the right model of church for our day? The Victorians' assumption that the vicar would do almost everything would seem to be a crying waste of the gifts and passions that together we share. And as more of our clergy care for three, six or more parishes, the nineteenth-century model is increasingly leaving our vicars tired, overstretched and liable to burn out.

We need a better way - one that draws on the rich talents, abilities and skills that our church members have. Here in Bath and Wells we're calling this "shared local ministry". Examples of what that can look like exist in many places around our diocese, neither firstcentury nor nineteenth-century, but an emerging twenty-first-century way of how we want "to get things done around here" [see page 4] - a better way to inhabit well the faith we've inherited in our time and generation.

Blessings proposed for same-sex couples

A release from the Church of England:

The Church of England has published prayers asking for God's blessing on same-sex couples as they give thanks for their civil marriage or civil partnership.

The draft texts, proposed by the bishops of the Church of England, will be considered by General Synod this month alongside other proposals in response to Living in Love and Faith, a six-year process of listening, learning and discernment on questions of identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage.

The bishops have also made a direct public apology to LGBTQI+ people for the way in which the Church has rejected or excluded them. The apology is set out in a pastoral letter from the bishops which also recognises that they disagree over same-sex marriage and proposes a way forward which could be put in action within months.

The bishops' proposals and recommendations for further work are set out in a report. Living in Love and Faith: a response from the Bishops of the Church of England about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage.

There is also a book of draft worship resources, Prayers of Love and Faith. It is a range of prayers and readings which could be used in a church service, such as a Service of the Word or a Service within a Celebration of Holy Communion.

There are prayers of thanksgiving and dedication and a prayer for God's blessing, as well as prayers for use with specific elements of a service, such as a Prayer when Rings are Worn and Prayers at the lighting of a candle.

Opening the letter the bishops write: "We want to apologise for the ways in which the Church of England has treated LGBTQI+



people - both those who worship in our churches and those who do not.

"For the times we have rejected or excluded you, and those you love, we are deeply sorry. The occasions on which you have received a hostile and homophobic response in our churches are shameful, and for this we repent.

"We have not loved you as God loves you, and that is profoundly wrong. We affirm, publicly and unequivocally, that LGBTQI+ people are welcome and valued: we are all children of God."

Describing the prayers and readings, they explain: "This resource will offer clergy a variety of flexible ways to affirm and celebrate same-sex couples in church, and will include prayers of dedication, prayers of thanksgiving and prayers for God's blessing.

"This resource will represent a significant move that is intended as a loving and celebratory response to same-sex couples who are cherished and deeply valued by the Church."

They explain that the prayers will be entirely discretionary and that the formal teaching of the Church of England as set out in the canons and authorised liturgies - that Holy Matrimony is between one man and one woman for life - would not change.

"While there is a range of convictions held by the bishops about this important matter, we have not found sufficient consensus to propose a change in doctrine at the present time," they write.

The bishops' proposals will be discussed at General Synod, which meets on 6–9 February.

The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, who chaired the group which led the process of discernment and decision making, said: "We are so grateful to the thousands of people across the Church of England who have taken part in this unique exercise in listening and learning together. We have taken all of those responses to heart and they have been vital in helping shape the proposals we are putting forward today."

About Christ Church

THE CHURCH We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and



organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

For anyone concerned about the health risks of congregational singing, we do not sing at the 8am BCP Communion or 5pm Quiet Service.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
