From the priest-in-charge...

Revd Lore Chumbley writes:

What varied and delightful talents God has given us! Over the past few weeks, as part of our “Time and Talent” challenge, I have enjoyed brunch followed by a guided walk, a creative writing session, bought six beautiful wild flower coasters and had some (very necessary) remedial help on my allotment. Not only that, I am also looking forward to a harp lesson, a re-ordered library, and what more will be revealed at our mini fête on Sunday 21 May.

Your response to the challenge to use your God-given talents and raise money for both our chosen charity and Christ Church has been extraordinary. There’s still time to get involved if you haven’t yet. As I followed a cheerful crocodile of walkers up hill and down dale last month on Kara’s guided walk, I was struck by how the challenge has brought people together in new ways doing unexpected activities, and just how valuable that is.

In these weeks after Easter, the lectionary insists that we hear readings from the Acts of the Apostles describing the growth of the infant church. Initially it was a Jerusalem-based movement, consisting only of those who had known and followed Jesus. As the Holy Spirit worked like yeast, the group grew in number and confidence but was still based in one place. At Pentecost, forty days after the Resurrection, the Holy Spirit set the church free. People from all over the Mediterranean region, visiting Jerusalem for the feast of Pentecost,

heard Peter preaching, “each in their own language.” As they returned home with the news of the Resurrection and the extraordinary happenings in Jerusalem ringing in their ears, new churches sprang up.

Like every church in the world, Christ Church is a descendant of that first Jerusalem “church.” We only exist because of the courage and faith of the disciples and first followers of Jesus. As we strengthen our fellowship and share our time and talents, let’s remember that we do so as one link in the chain of believers that reaches right back to the upper room with Jesus and forward into the future.

Celebrating the Coronation

By the time you read this, the Coronation will have taken place of his Majesty King Charles III and her Majesty Camilla the Queen Consort. The occasion is as much a religious service as a civil formality, and Bishop Michael Beasley takes an active role as Bishop Assistant to the King alongside the Bishop of Durham, a role which has been carried out by the Bishop of Bath and Wells at every coronation since that of Richard I in 1189.

Services of celebration and community events will continue in the coming weeks, with prayers being offered for the King and Queen Consort. Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was famously a person of faith, and the tenor of King Charles's service is suggested in "the King's Prayer" from the Coronation liturgy:

*God of compassion and mercy,
whose Son was sent not to be served but to serve,
give grace that I may find in thy service perfect freedom
and in that freedom knowledge of thy truth.
Grant that I may be a blessing to all thy children,
of every faith and conviction,
that together we may discover the ways of gentleness
and be led into the paths of peace.
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
Amen.*




Christ Church ACM

The Annual General Church Meeting of the Christ Church congregation will be held on Sunday 14 May after the 10am service – so starting at about 11:15am. Come along to elect Churchwardens, Deanery Synod representatives and members of Church Council, and receive reports on the activities of all the groups in the church. Anyone can attend, but you must be on the Electoral Roll of Christ Church to vote.

Bishop's Message for May

Remember Jesus too



**From the Rt Revd Michael Beasley,
Bishop of Bath and Wells**

Writing about the celebration of Holy Communion almost eighty years ago, Gregory Dix posed the question “Was ever another command so obeyed?” It’s well worth searching online for his whole answer. An edited quote of his response reads:

“For century after century, spreading slowly to every continent and country and among every race on earth, this action has been done, in every conceivable human circumstance, for every conceivable human need. People have found no better thing than this to do for kings at their crowning and for criminals going to the scaffold; for armies in triumph or for a bride and bridegroom in a little country church; for the wisdom of the Parliament of a mighty nation or for a sick old woman afraid to die; while the lions roared in the nearby amphitheatre; on the beach at Dunkirk. And best of all, week by week and month by month, on a hundred thousand successive Sundays, faithfully, unfailingly, across all the parishes of Christendom,

the pastors have done this just to make the plebs sancta Dei – the holy common people of God.”

The first of Dix’s scenarios will be played out before us at the Coronation of King Charles III. At the heart of the ceremony, amidst all the pomp and circumstance, the oaths and declarations, the regalia and crowning, will be the celebration of Holy Communion. The words used will be just the same as those spoken in our parish churches Sunday by Sunday. From Communion, the King and Queen will be sent out from Westminster Abbey to live like us the prayer we say at the end of many of our services. They will offer “their souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice, sent out in the power of [God’s] Spirit to live and work to [God’s] praise and glory.”

The command that the King, Queen and all of us obey is Jesus’s direction to “Do this in remembrance of me.” So, as you watch the Coronation please remember Jesus too. For he is the one who comes to us as a servant; the King of kings.



About Christ Church

*We're a liberal, inclusive and open church,
seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty
in our faith and doubt, and support in our community*

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and

organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

For anyone concerned about the health risks of congregational singing, we do not sing at the 8am BCP Communion or 5pm Quiet Service.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
