

Let your light shine

The lanterns are repaired, restored and blessed

On the feast of Christ the King, Sunday 24 November, we not only celebrated our patronal festival together with our friends from St Stephen's Lansdown and St Mary's Charlcombe at our 10am service. We also welcomed Bishop Peter Maurice, Bishop of Taunton, who was our celebrant and afterwards blessed our newly repaired lanterns outside.

The repairs had been made possible by bequests given in loving memory of Frank Twissell and Audrey and Geoffrey Sheppard, all of whom had a long association with Christ Church. Stonework repair was carried out by Minerva Stone and metalwork by Ironart.

A remarkable piece of history came to light in the course of the repairs: when Ironart took off the thick layers of paint on the metalwork, they discovered that one of the lanterns had two bullet holes in it. These were 7.62mm in diameter,

matching the machine-guns used by the Luftwaffe in the Second World War.

The Julian Road area was very badly affected in the Bath Blitz of April 1942, but we don't have records of any other damage to Christ Church. It would be astonishing if this were the only damage that Christ Church suffered. A possible explanation is that the lanterns actually hung elsewhere at the time and came here only later. They certainly aren't here in photos taken around 1890.

The lanterns themselves don't shed any further light on this mystery, but they'll once again light the entrance to Christ Church and welcome visitors, especially to the ever-popular evening services for Advent and Christmas.



Open Christmas

Bath Foodbank appeal

Emergency food for local people in crisis

Families on the borderline, trying to make ends meet, can be severely thrown by a sudden demand on their resources and find themselves without funds to buy food. That's where Foodbank can step in to help, and Foodbank needs your support.

People may be referred to Foodbank by social and health services, Citizens Advice Bureau or other advice agencies and charities. The kinds of crises that lead to referrals are: benefit delays, benefit changes, debt, low income, illness, domestic abuse, delayed wages.

Bath Foodbank, run by Genesis Trust, will supply vouchers that can be exchanged for non-perishable supplies to tide clients over a crisis. The list of items is carefully drawn up to provide a nutritionally-balanced food parcel to last three days. There is a limit of three issues of vouchers to any one applicant; after that, clients are referred to the social services.

Demand for Foodbank vouchers in Bath has risen threefold in the past year, with almost 400 people being fed by Foodbank in April this year, matching the previous peak in November 2012, and the need is likely to grow rather than shrink. Foodbank is struggling to keep up supply, so our donations, particularly at this time of year, are urgently sought.

Most wanted are: longlife milk, longlife juice, sugar, tinned meat products, instant mash, sponge pudding, rice pudding, tinned fruit, chocolate and sweet treats.

Also needed: tinned vegetables, tinned tomatoes, tinned fish, cereal, tea/coffee, pasta sauces, pasta/rice, biscuits, feminine hygiene products/deodorants, tinned/packet soups and baked beans.

There's now a collection basket at the back of the church. Donations of cash are also welcome, to help defray costs such as warehousing, admin and transport, and Christ Church Council has voted to include Foodbank on the list of charities we'll support by means of retiring collections – see below. We're also asked to remember Foodbank and its clients in our prayers.

Supporting charities and good causes

As a charity, Christ Church is prohibited from giving money to other charities. (It's just one more consequence of not being a "normal" church!) This makes it tricky to put our faith into practice and support good causes in a practical way. We can, however, pass on funds received for a specific cause in the first place, not simply given to Christ Church. So Council has drafted a list of charities we want to support, and proposes a retiring collection on the second Sunday of each month for a specified charity from the list. There's a mix of local, national and international causes, from Julian House and the Women's Refuge to Help for Heroes and the Prince's Trust, to Water Aid and UNICEF. Watch for full details soon!

The Christmas starts with Christ campaign kicks off on I December and runs up to Christmas Day, with a national advertising programme using posters and radio ads. As the Bishop of Taunton, the Rt Revd Peter Maurice, says: "The Christmas Starts with Christ campaign is an invitation to the Church to put Christ and the wonderful story of his birth at the heart of the nation's favourite time of the year. The story of the birth of Jesus is where it begins for Christians.

"Up and down the country, the star which lights the stable reminds us of the light of love and compassion that churches seek to bring into their communities throughout the year, and it is important that we don't forget 'the reason for the season.' Our purpose is to continue to tell the story because it reveals a God who chose, out of sheer love, to make his home with humanity, offering hope and promise even into its darkest corners."

One way that the campaign hopes to get the Christmas story out is the Real Advent Calendar. Behind each of its windows is a line of the Christmas story and a Fairtrade chocolate star. Behind the final window is a 24-page Christmas storybook. The Real Advent Calendar costs £3.99 (part of which goes to The Children's Society). Diocesan Message for December

The Unbelievable Truth



From The Venerable Andy Piggott, Archdeacon of Bath

I enjoy listening to the radio when I'm travelling around the archdeaconry. On Sunday mornings as I drive home from parishes, I usually turn to Radio 4 to enjoy *Just a Minute, I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue* or one of the other comedy shows that form the staple diet of this pre-prandial broadcasting slot. Unless of course *Test Match Special* is on!

In recent years a new programme has appeared, *The Unbelievable Truth*. Panel members give a short lecture on a given topic and the aim is to "smuggle truths" past fellow panellists, who in turn have to "spot" truth-telling from falsehood. The mini lecture can be very amusing but, apart from five "truths", is entire fabrication.

I've been thinking about truth-telling in the last week or so. The news has been dominated by coverage of a court case and a Parliamentary enquiry in which at the heart is the question, "who is telling the truth?" Were three policemen telling lies about a former Cabinet Minister? Was Rebekah Brooks aware of what was going on within the organisation for which she held key responsibility?

How good are we at truth-telling? Would you dare tell someone you love that their hair looks awful or give an honest answer to the question most



husbands dread, "Does my bum look big in this?"

More seriously, are we tempted to collude when others hide from the painful truth that the one they love is terminally ill? When we've been hurt deeply by someone we love, do we say we're fine, or tell them the truth?

What is truth?

• John tells us in his Gospel that Jesus is the **true** light (1:9).

• He came from the Father, full of grace and truth (1:13).

• Later he records the words of Jesus himself, "I am the Way, the **Truth** and the Life" (14:6)

• And "For this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. **Everyone on the side of truth listens to me**" (18.37).

In Jesus Christ, God's truth is

embodied and personified. Jesus makes real for us the truth of God's love and commitment to everyone. His whole life was lived seeking to reveal God's love for us and for all people.

As the season of Advent begins, I'm challenged by Jesus, who is the Truth, to live truthfully. I reckon myself to be on the side of truth, so I resolve to live with utter integrity. I want to avoid telling the bald truth without love, and I want never to manipulate the truth by exaggeration or telling only that part of a story that reflects well on me. As Jesus came into the world to testify to the truth, I too want to commit myself in all that I am to living a life which speaks of God's love in Christ for me. And to that end I pray the Spirit will fill me with the same grace and truth Jesus showed to all he met.

And as we naturally begin to turn our eyes to our celebrations of Christ's first coming, I'm humbled and in awe again of the truth that in this baby, the truth of who God is was truly revealed.

Unbelievable? It's the truth. Archdeacon Andy Piggott

Bishop's message for November

From the Right Revd Peter Maurice, Bishop of Taunton

As many of you will know, this period in the Church's year between All Saints and Advent is known as "The Kingdom Season", and it invites us to reflect on what we believe the church is for.

You will have your own views, but at the heart of my response to that question as I look forward to Advent and Christmas is my continuing belief in a God who chose to come and make his home among us.

In other words the church is called to be a sign of the God who has come to earth to dwell with his people. Our purpose as a church is not only to make better the lives of individuals, but through them to enable local communities to flourish as well. It is only when a community flourishes that the individuals who live there can live well, which is why the church is right to be so concerned at the levels of increasing poverty and debt that we are witnessing across the country.

"Seek the welfare of the city", God told the exiled Jews through the mouth of the prophet Jeremiah, because in its welfare you will find your welfare. On a recent visit to the Halcon Estate in Taunton that is what I witnessed. The church at the heart of one of the most deprived parts of our diocese working in partnership with the school, the police, social services and other willing partners to enable the community to flourish – the Kingdom of God at work!

For all its weaknesses and foibles the church is still populated by Christian people who quietly go about the business of being Christians in their workplaces and communities, transforming them by their patience, kindness and generosity often over long periods of time. May God give us grace to continue to give evidence of the Kingdom by seeking the welfare of the communities in which we are set.

Supporting the United Society

Find out about the organisation formerly known as USPG

Christ Church has supported the United Society, formerly USPG, for several decades. We are delighted to welcome to our 10am service on 8th December Heather Skull, US's Outreach and Engagement Officer, to tell us of her first hand experiences following a recent visit to Zimbabwe.

We've all been shocked by graphic images of the recent devastation in the Philippines (where US also works) and it's timely to be reminded that we are all part of a common humanity, and as Christians, part of the worldwide Church. So it's good to have this link with US, to learn more about the experiences of Christians in other countries and to support them both by giving and by our prayers.

US changed their name a year ago. Previously known as United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, they realised that this name was not connecting with people in the 21st century. They state: "Our new name is rooted in the gospel. It is a reminder that God's love is for all of us – Jesus' promise of a full life is for every person in every community. We are all part of 'us', regardless of faith, ethnicity, gender or sexuality. We are all made in God's creative image. There is room for us all."

US has been working for over 300 years, sharing God's love through action in Brazil, Asia and many African countries. They aim to support the development of local skills and the empowerment of communities, leading to change from within, rather than giving handouts. While their programme



partners are predominantly Anglican, they work ecumenically and with other faith communities for the benefit of all people, regardless of ethnicity, gender or sexuality. Their aim is to fulfil Christ's words "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full". (John 10:10)

At the moment we don't make a regular financial contribution to US, but our recent Harvest retiring collection went to them. There are some little collection boxes at the back of the church, along with some of their literature (look out for the bright pink logo shown above), and I would like to encourage you to take a collecting box for any odd change that may be weighing down your purses and wallets – it all adds up! #Christmasmeans twitter campaign

On Christmas Eve, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby (@ABCJustin and @lambethpalace), and the Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu (@johnsentamu) will be using the hashtag #Christmasmeans in order to spread the message of the real meaning of Christmas.

On Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, congregations and clergy in the 12,000 parishes of the Church of England are being encouraged to get out their mobile devices and finish the sentence: Christmas means... to let as many people as possible know the joy and meaning of Christmas to the 10 million people who make up the UK's 'Twitterati' and further across the world.

#Christmasmeans follows on from last year's successful **#ChristmasstartswithChrist** campaign which reached more than 9 million people in 24 hours. During a 12 hour period from mid-

night on Christmas eve through to lunchtime on Christmas day over 9,000 tweets were sent using the hashtag.

"We are delighted that **#christmasmeans** gives us this opportunity for parishes to take the good news of the first Christmas beyond churches and into people's lives and homes," says the Revd Arun Arora (@**RevArun**), Director of Communications at the Archbishops' Council. "Whilst for some people Christmas means the John Lewis Advert, the Harrods window or crippling debt, around the country on Christmas Day **#Christmasmeans** hymns, cribs, nativity and most of all joy"

The hashtag **#Christmasmeans** goes live on Christmas Eve. Tweets can be expected from carol, crib and midnight services, before carrying on into Christmas morning services.

Archbishop speaks at Church Urban Fund conference

Archbishop Justin has said that Christians cannot escape participating in politics because seeking justice and the common good are 'absolutely central' to their faith.

In a keynote address to the Church Urban Fund's 'Tackling Poverty Together Conference', the Archbishop said that for Christians, loving our neighbour places 'responsibilities' upon us.

'We don't speak about common good and justice because we think we have some automatic right to be heard,' he said, 'but because loving our neighbour places responsibilities upon us. We have responsibilities to speak, even when it might be easier to stay quiet, to point to injustice and to challenge others to join us in righting it.

The Archbishop praised the Church Urban Fund (**cuf.org.uk**) for its 'focus on delivering projects through local partnerships, [which] cuts through one of the great political challenges of the present day – how one actually makes a difference on the ground'.

Church ministry playing vital role in every community

Ministry stats for 2012, published by the Research and Statistics Division of the Archbishops' Council, show a change in patterns of ministry over the past 10 years with numbers remaining largely constant. The overall number of diocesan licensed clergy declined by 1% in the decade between 2002 and 2012. The number of full-time stipendiary clergy was 7,798 in 2012, a fall of 2% since 2011.

They now represent 69% of all licensed clergy compared to 80% in 2002. Over the

same period the number of self-supporting ministers increased by 50% from 2,091 in 2002 to 3,148.

The number of ordinations has remained broadly stable since 2002. In 2012 22% of recommended candidates were under the age of 30, compared to 15% in both 2002 and 2007. This reflects a focus in the dioceses on encouraging vocations among younger people. **The statistics can be viewed at: bit.ly/17xAqDP**

About Christ Church

We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OFE seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the normal Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. There is the option of separate activities for children in Junior Church groups during our 10am Sunday service.

As well as worship on a Sunday morning, there are many other activities going on in our community. We support the Genesis Sunday Centre and have our own community café. The musical tradition of the church continues to thrive, and we have an active choir. New singers of all ages are always very welcome. Our ecumenical Home Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting.
