

New Beginnings, A Constant Comfort

I have always liked September. In my mind it is associated with new beginnings. I expect this is because I have spent all my working life in



schools and colleges. Every new school year begins with the issue of new exercise books. The unblemished pages offer the prospect of excellence and achievement with past errors forgotten.

It's true there is nothing like starting again but its not all that easy. The problem with September is that it is not same beginning place for everyone. Many come as the youngest in their schools or classes, unsure of what is expected of them. Others have ceased to be Juniors and suddenly realise there are different forms of conduct and performance expected of Seniors. And perhaps the worst thing of all for some is the realisation that they are at the threshold of their final year. One way or the other things are never going to be same.

Whether we are beginning a new term, a new job or even retirement there are always thoughts of how we are going to cope. Will we know which way to go? Will anyone remember speak to us? And if they do, will we know what to say? I remember seeing a drawing in a bound copy of the humorous magazine Punch. In the nineteenth century the laugh usually came from an observation rather than a joke. The picture showed beautifully dressed men and women sweeping into a grand hotel where a ball was being held. In the foreground were two mud-spattered street urchins and the one turns to the others and says: "What I wants to know is, where do I fit in?"

In spite of the grammar, the question resonates with all of us. Deep within us is the natural and desperate need to fit in, to know our place. On my first day at school, I arrived not knowing that it was the custom to bring a couple of biscuits to eat with the midmorning milk. I felt out of place and foolish. When I got home and my parents asked how I enjoyed school, all I could think to do was to blurt out that I had had no biscuits. I hadn't been able to fit in

and so I forgot all about the bright classroom filled with books and toys and all the children who might be my friends.

The nature of life dictates that we are always making new beginning, meeting new people and trying to make sense of fresh places. And the unspoken question which haunts us is: how do I fit in? Which is another way of saying: who am I?.

Our prayers and reading of the scriptures bring the glorious answer which is, nevertheless, so hard to believe and hold on to. In the silence and in the spaces between the words God says: You are my child who has been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. As we face our new days, our farewells and our home comings nothing can change the fact that no matter what other people call us, God calls us his sons and daughters.

Food for thought at Wells this Autumn

A series of lectures at Wells Cathedral focussing on the future of the Church of England in a fast-changing world.

Every Tuesday from September 15 to October 13 7.30pm—9.00pm Free admission

This year's Autumn Lecture Series of five weekly talks will investigate the church from a variety of perspectives, including the arts and contemporary expressions of Christianity, and the Anglican Church in the context of political order, a changing culture and the worship of other faiths.



The Very Rev Nick Bury, Dean of Gloucester, launches the series and is expected to address 20th century poetry and art in sacred spaces.

Theo Hobson, a London theologian, argues in the September 22 lecture, entitled The Church and the Liberal State, that Christianity must affirm secular liberalism and reject its old links with Christendom. In his view, a truly liberal form of Christianity entails the separation of church and state.

Professor Grace Davie, who has a personal Chair in Sociology of Religion at the University of Exeter, will address the topic From Obligation To Consumption: Different Ways Of Being Church, in the third lecture.

The fourth in the series, TS Eliot Revisited—The End Of Christian Society?, will be delivered by the Very Rev John Clarke, who has been Dean of Wells since 2004. He is particularly interested in how to speak of God in the contemporary world.

The series will conclude with a lecture by the Bishop of Bath and Wells, the Rt Rev Peter Price. He will discuss The Church of England: The Next 25 Years in the Context of Other Faiths, the Worldwide Church and the Anglican Communion. The bishop's special interests include small Christian communities and he is active in issues of reconciliation.

The Contemplative Path

The Contemplative Path is the title of a day designed to explore contemplation and the life of Etty Hillesum, who developed a profound spirituality before dying in Auschwitz. It will be led by Canon Patrick Woodhouse, Precentor of Wells Cathedral and author of a book about Ette Hillesum called, "A Life Transformed".


All our yesterdays

Again we dip into the archives for a taste of life at Christ Church at the end of the nineteenth century. This month the focus is on the church as a social centre.

The flats situated across the car park at the west end of the church are known as Christ Church Hall because that is what the building used to be—our Church Hall. The building was sold to the local authority in the 1960's, but in the 1890's and well into the 20th century the building housed a thriving social and recreational centre.

It is September, 1898:

he Christ Church Club which has done some useful work during the summer months, is now getting things in trim for the winter season. The Cricket Club worked well. Its advantages in helping our young men to become proficient in this manly game were great, and others who walked out as spectators and friends thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity. Thanks are



given to those who by their kind donations made this effort possible.

The Billiards Club is also very popular...

he Tournament that has been running for the past three months was one of the largest and best ever held in the club. Our Committee hopes, with the help of friends to be able to start another contest for he winter months.

Success is proving to be a mixed blessing for the bagatelle players.



he Bagatelle Board has become worn out with constant use and it has been necessary to order its repair. When it is ready the Committee will contemplate making the small charge of one half pence per game to reimburse the expense. This table has had little rest for years, game following game without any charge, and

proving a great attraction to the younger men.

The Draughts Section presided over by the Revd FM Russell-Davies is gaining a city-wide reputation.

The game has been studied in real earnest. The League Team reported that they still held the Bath Draughts League Challenge Shield". [This shield is still in the church today!]

Other activities include, gymnastics, chess and woodwork. However, there are worries about the "heavy atmosphere" on winter nights when the gas heaters were on. 1898 sees an important change.

he Committee have determined to introduce the incandescent [electric] light into all the rooms., in the hope not only to increase the light in the evenings, but also to reduce the number of burners and thus improve the purity of the air.

Recreation apart, there are other important examples of what we would now call, social outreach.

he Dinner Kitchen, 27 Morford Street will be reopened on Thursday 2nd November. Although money paid for tickets goes a long way to covering the expenses of the Kitchen, the Treasurer...would be glad to receive some fresh subscriptions. The Kitchens are a great boon to the poor.

Also of great benefit to the poor is the Christ Church Winter Fund. The Vicar appeals for donations, explaining:



his Fund provides Bonuses for the Coal Club, the Clothing Club, and the Penny Bank, and supplies blankets to the poor at half price.

The appeal raises the sum of £30 4s 6d.

The Bath & Wells 1100th Anniversary Lecture, given in association with the University of Bath and Bath & North East Somerset Council will be given by The Honourable Mary Robinson.

Before the lecture, Mrs Robinson, who was the UN Commissioner for Human Rights, will be awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by the university. In 2004, she received Amnesty International's Ambassador of Conscience Award for her work in promoting human rights.

Circuit of Bath Walk

Homeless charity Julian House will be staging their 9th Circuit of Bath Walk on **Sunday 20 September**. The 20 mile circular route takes in some fantastic countryside on the edge of the city. Participants can do anywhere between 2 and 20 miles; thanks to the unique shuttle bus service that operates between start points on the day.



The route comprises public rights of way through Monkton Combe, Englishcombe, Newton St Loe, Upper Swainswick and Bathampton. Solsbury Hill, the Midford Valley and Woolley are just a few of the scenic highlights.

Not only is this a great day out but participants will also be giving a welcome boost to the charity's work. Although Julian House is best known for its busy Night Shelter, this is only one of services it provides for homeless men and women. Recognising that homelessness is not a single issue Julian House has developed new projects and facilities which aim to tackle the underlying problems which force men and women onto the streets.

Participants can start at any of the five check points, where detailed route instructions are supplied.

PAST HISTORY

Christ Church was built at the end of the 18th Century by the socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship by the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church of that time to provide seating free of charge. Early supporters included the Archbishops of Canterbury and York; the great evangelical campaigner against slavery, William Wilberforce; Philip Pusey, the father of E B Pusey; and Martin Stafford Smith, the godfather of John Keble, who were both founders of the Oxford Movement. The building was designed by the famous Bath architect John Palmer, who was responsible for the completion of the Great Pump Room, Lansdown Crescent and St Swithin's, the parish church of Walcot. In November 1998, the congregation, friends and well-wishers from all over the world celebrated the bicentenary.

MINISTRY

Christ Church is unusual in not being a parish church. Much of the vitality of its life and worship derives from the fact that the congregation comes from all areas of the city and the surrounding districts. Whilst there is no full-time paid vicar, there is a non-stipendiary priest-in-charge, who leads a ministerial team of ordained and lay people. Worship at Christ Church largely reflects the traditions of those responsible for its foundation and the rich diversity of the Church of England as a whole. Thus, preaching and Bible-based teaching is firmly set within a liturgical setting which is best described as liberal and catholic.

SERVICES

The 8am Holy Communion is either Book of Common Prayer (1662) or Common Worship. At 10am the Eucharist is celebrated according to Common Worship. On the first Sunday of each month, there is a full Choral Evensong. A Junior Church and a Crêche cater for the children and young people who attend the 10am service. We hold special all-age services once a month and at festivals such as Easter, Christmas, Mothering Sunday and Harvest.

There are a variety of mid-week activities including Holy Communion at 11am every Wednesday during Lent, followed by lunch). The notice board and the weekly notice sheet provide details of discussion and prayer groups which are held at different times throughout the year. An all-age choir, which rehearses on Friday evenings maintains the much-admired music tradition at Christ Church.
