



New lobby opens for Easter

Christ Church becomes an even more welcoming place

Everyone coming to Christ Church over Holy Week and the Easter period was welcomed through our newly refurbished main entrance and lobby, completed on schedule and on budget (in fact *under* budget, although some detail work and “snagging” is still to be done). In place of the unwelcoming old wooden “draught-proof” inner porch structure, which dominated the lobby space and

felt like a barrier to entry (see page 3), there is now a bright, open space with light oak framed glass doors, offering a view right through into the body of the church. Instead of the uneven, unstable wood-block floor, there’s a smooth limestone floor. And instead of a gloomy, chilly vestibule open to the winds, we now have a well-lit, more usable lobby warmed by large new radiators.

Some final work is being undertaken this month. The wooden main West doors have been rehung to open outwards, but hinged flaps are to be fitted to their top edges to enable them to open fully against the curved roof of the stone outer arch. They will also be stripped and re-oiled. Door closers will be fitted on the new inner glass doors.

The Trustees decided to defer installing automatic opening mechanisms on either set of new glass doors because of the huge cost – and because wheelchair users are not likely to be using the new entrance until the proposed access ramp is built, which won’t happen until we’ve done some serious fundraising – but the necessary wiring etc is in place in readiness. The originally specified “wheelchair-friendly” entrance mat turned out to be unavailable and coir has been fitted instead (at much lower cost); this is designed to be replaceable when the entrance is made fully accessible in due course. As reported at our AGM on Sunday 30 April, some work is also still to be done on our refurbished lavatories to make them fully compliant with accessibility requirements.

Bishop's Message for May

Thanks for responding with generosity



**From the Rt Revd Ruth Worsley,
Bishop of Taunton**

This month I want to say a huge "THANK YOU!" to you all. In 2016, for the first time since 2009, the parishes in the Dioceses collectively contributed over 99% of the Parish Share requested for the Common Fund. All but 21 parishes made their full financial contribution. We know that for most parishes the Parish Share is the largest amount in your budget. You have made great efforts. Thank you so very much!

There will always be a few parishes each year that have particular financial issues which mean you can't quite make the full amount and I want to say "thank you" to you too. Thank you for doing your best and thank you for working with our central staff in finance and stewardship as they seek to help your parish rise to the challenge.

Parish Share is essential to the mission of the Church in the diocese; without it our parochial clergy could not be supported. The Common Fund is the diocese's largest single income stream. Through Parish Share, each church is given the opportunity of contributing towards the financial cost of ministry in the entire diocese. Larger and wealthier parishes are asked to make greater contributions so stipendiary ministry can be provided to less wealthy areas that otherwise might not have been able to afford it.

As Paul wrote:

"Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality. At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need."

(2 Corinthians 8:13-14a, NIV)

So, "Thank you!" for your commitment and generosity in this past year. It is a wonderful response to the generous love of God for us which is demonstrated so amazingly in the Easter story.

Wells Cathedral special interest tours



Are you interested in medieval stained glass? Wells Cathedral has one of the biggest collections in England, and on Tuesday 16 May is offering three different stained glass special interest tours. One focuses on angels, with images including trumpeting resurrection angels, barefoot seraphim on wheels, an arch-

angel slaying a dragon, and the Annunciation. Or possibly you're interested in medieval stone carvings, such as those on the remarkable West Front of Wells Cathedral? Another special interest tour will describe them, their carvers and the stone they were create from.

Each 90-minute tour is part of the Cathedral's programme of pre-bookable special interest tours for 2017, led by experienced guides, which offer an insight into the Cathedral embroidery, stained glass, carvings, gothic architecture and chained library.

This month's charity: Burlington House

The loose collection in the plate on Sunday 14 May, plus an optional retiring collection for the rest of May, will go to Burlington House, run by DHI in Burlington Street. (Donations in collection envelopes will continue to go to Christ Church.)

Burlington House, an abstinence-based supported house in Burlington Street, near Christ Church, is a unique and cost effective supported dry house. As well as offering a highly affordable alternative to residential or hospital detox rehab, the 11 bedroom shared house enables people to consolidate their recovery within their community.

Burlington House is a unique detox and supported housing project that supports vulnerable (often but not necessarily homeless)

adults to overcome drug and/or alcohol dependency and to make a full and sustained recovery in the community. Approximately 70% of beneficiaries leave drug/alcohol free and

successfully move on to independent lives. This compares to 20-60% success rate for residential rehab. A whopping 80% of our residents are in employment, training, education and/or volunteering when they leave.

Developing Health and Independence (formerly known as the Drugs and Homeless Initiative) is a local charity set up in 1999 to help people out of the cycle of homelessness, social isolation and drug or alcohol abuse. Our aim is to offer people a wide range of services that help them gain control of their lives again and live independently.

We now have a unique opportunity to buy our supported house in Bath and safeguard its long-term use for vulnerable and homeless drug/alcohol users in Bath who wish to turn their lives around. We need to raise £155,000 to buy the property outright (the remaining cost of the purchase would be covered by a generous grant by Public Health England). Burlington House costs approximately ten times less than traditional rehab facilities, so sustaining it for the future saves public money.

Two new service cards for Holy Baptism

It's important to help guests at a baptism feel welcome and at ease, and providing an easy-to-follow service is part of that. The two new Service Cards offer the text of the baptism service for use within or outside of Holy Communion, featuring the Additional Baptism Texts in Accessible Language. Their bright, full-colour design matches the rest of the Christenings materials, designed to be engaging and accessible to those less familiar with church. The three panel fold-out format ensures it is slim enough

to fit neatly onto a pew shelf and is made with a heavier weighted card to help it last.

A new Baptism certificate

Parents expect and like to receive a commemorative certificate of baptism which they can keep as the child grows up. This new design continues with the light, water and journey themes of all the other Christenings materials produced by the Life Events team. It includes space to write in all the important details: the child's name, date of birth, date of baptism, the names of parents and the godparents. And for as long as they have the certificate, children and parents will be reminded to pray with a simple prayer on the reverse of the certificate.

Lent and Easter on social media

The Christian message of Lent and Easter reached millions of people this year thanks to the support from the CofE's 16,000+ churches who joined our national social media campaign. Here's a birdseye view of our approach:

1. Taking people on a discipleship journey. We worked together with Church House Publishing and Christian Aid to share their #LiveLent discipleship booklet on social media, which included daily reflections and Bible passages. We also posted prayers.

2. Asking our 16,000+ churches and Christian communities across the country to share photos and videos. Twitter Moments continue to catch the eye and we also used Facebook albums and Instagram to help content reach the widest audience.

3. Using simple graphics to explain what each of the key moments on the Lent, Holy Week and Easter journey mean.

The key thing with the above was to engage as many people around the country in our campaign and we've been really encouraged by the results. We reached over 2.5 million people on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram.

We could not have run the campaign without dioceses and parishes across the country sending in and sharing prayers, pictures and other posts.

Top tips for churches to reach more people on social media

The value of photos in social media updates that bring your community to life - they make a huge difference to levels of engagement with your posts.

Use small amounts of money to boost your posts, particularly on Facebook - £5, £10 or £20 behind a post that shares your Holy Week events, pictures from a recent service or something that you're doing can vastly increase reach. Take a look at this guide for more.

Try and post your content on the same day it happens - this helps your photos, videos or messages have the most impact. We've found the best times to post on a weekday are 7-9am, 12-1pm and 5-7pm, and 8-9 or 5-7 on Sundays.

About Christ Church

*We're a liberal, inclusive and open church,
seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty
in our faith and doubt, and support in our community*

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the normal Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our

robed choir and organist. There is the option of separate activities for children in Junior Church groups during our 10am Sunday service.

As well as worship on Sunday and Thursday mornings, there are many other activities going on in our community. We support the Genesis Sunday Centre and have our own community café. The musical tradition of the church continues to thrive, and we have an active choir; new singers of all ages are always very welcome. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting.
