It's been a busy summer already at Christ Church, and there are more events and activities to come.

At the end of June we hosted a service to mark the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the *Empire Windrush* and to celebrate the Caribbean community in Bath, their contribution to the city and to Christ Church. If you couldn't attend you can still enjoy the video, which is accessible from our Christ Church Facebook page. It's worth seeing and hearing.

At the beginning of this month Michael and Marcus were confirmed at a service in Bathford. We warmly welcome both of them as full members of the church.

We are looking forward to Professor Bruce Chilton's visit on Thursday 20 July, when he will speak on the first celebration of the Eucharist – and how it might have felt actually to be there. Don't miss your chance to hear this internationally renowned speaker.

On Saturday 22 July we have a chance to give back to the community when, together with the Museum of Bath at Work, St Mary's Catholic Church and DHI, we will hold a Julian Road Community Celebration. This will be the second such event and, as Jane our churchwarden explained, "It's a church fête!" She's right. There will be everything you would expect at a church fête plus glorious "end of the pier" organ music played by David Wrigley, a chance to try out bell ringing

in Christ Church, a film in the museum showing Julian Road after damage from the bombs of the Second World War, a vintage ice cream tricycle, and the Rainbow Steel Band will play.

There's so much going on, it might make one feel tired. But no. In the hot, dry days of summer we are to get our spiritual roots deep into the streams of living water of which Jesus speaks. If we are deeply rooted in the Holy Spirit then however active we are or whatever happens to us and those around us, we will be "like trees planted by the water whose leaves never wither." So as well as the excitement of our summer activities may we also make a conscious effort to be, as Paul suggests, "rooted and grounded in God." Have a good summer.

## Upper Mews update

### **Nick Wells, Chair of Trustees, writes:**

Many of you will know that the rooms above the Lower Mews were let commercially to the Bath Academy of Media Makeup for many years. Sadly, BAMB left last summer and we therefore sought a new tenant. This was no easy task and also required obtaining permission to broaden the usage of the premises. We are delighted that Emily Mander Hair Ltd opened for business in the middle of June following an internal refit of the premises. We wish Emily every success in her new premises.

Shortly after signing the lease, in March, during a period of heavy rain, both the flat roof on the kitchen (at the right-hand side of the Mews looking from the car park) and the main roof started leaking. Following investigation, the flat roof has now been completely replaced and the main roof patched, some of the associated woodwork repaired and the guttering adjusted.

We hope this work will cure the leaks in the main roof. If not, we face having to replace the roof, which is thought to be around 70 years old.

We are grateful to our neighbours for their forbearance regarding the scaffolding and noise from these works.

Maintaining our buildings costs a lot of money but the Upper Mews and the Cottages, together with the car park, are also an important source of income for the Trust, helping us in our work and outreach to the local community.

The last weekend in June was filled with joy as 10 people were ordained priest in two separate services at Bath Abbey and Taunton Minster on Saturday, and on Sunday Wells Cathedral was filled with family and friends for the ordination of 13 new deacons. # Julian Road Celebration Curate's corner

If you live on or near Julian Road, then don't miss this free community event! Organised jointly by the Museum of Bath at Work, Christ Church, St Mary's Catholic Church, and DHI (Developing Health and Independence), it will take place in the Christ Church car park on Julian Road on Saturday 22 July, 11am – 4pm.

There will be stalls and raffles, with games and a colouring project for children. You'll be able to enjoy the Rainbow Steel Band – probably the oldest Caribbean steel band in Britain – who will play outside if the weather is fine or in Christ Church if it rains. In the Museum of Bath at Work there will be a chance to watch a short film of Julian Road during some of the fiercest bombing of the Second World War. David Wrigley will be playing cinema-style music on the Christ Church organ. You can visit the hidden Eco Garden, enjoy a cup of tea and piece of cake, or treat yourself to an ice cream from the vintage ice cream tricycle.

We are delighted that the Mayor of Bath will visit at around 2:30pm and has agreed to draw the raffle at 3:30pm.

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## This month's charity

In July and August we are again supporting the USPG's Malawi project. The loose collection on the second and fourth Sunday of each month – 9 and 23 July, plus 13 and 27 August – will go to USPG. (Donations in collection envelopes continue to go to Christ Church.)

This is a commitment we have made over recent years to support USPG's work among women and girls in developing education, health and economic self-sufficiency in Malawi. The key areas the programme focuses on are: girls' education, livelihoods, environment and climate change, water, sanitation and hygiene. To improve literacy among girls, it focuses on increasing school enrolment and also works with communities and parents to reduce early marriages, early pregnancies, and the rate at which girls drop out of school.

I have just returned from a triumphant netball match where our Year 6 team from St. Andrew's beat Bathford school. This was the team's first match and the first time they had ever played on a full-size court, so we were all thrilled with the result. Many of the parents came to support. **writes:** I moved to Bath on New Year's Day 2018 to start a six-month contract at the University as a Teaching Fellow in Physics. Before moving, I had looked up churches with choirs in the city, as I had been singing at St John's

Church in West Byfleet for a number of years previously and it was important for me to find somewhere to continue this. I came across Christ Church and it looked a perfect fit for me, not only in style of worship and music, but the choir robes are an almost identical design to my previous church – it felt like it was meant to be!

I quickly settled in Bath, with my friends from Christ Church being a very important part of that. When my fixed term contract ended, I therefore looked for other jobs in the area. It was then that I rather fell into accountancy as a career, starting by being

placed through a temp agency as a purchase ledger clerk at the National Trust in Trowbridge. Both my parents are accountants, so I had always tried to avoid following in their footsteps, but I found that I really enjoyed the work and it suited my mindset. I started my ACCA studies, which I completed in January this year to become a fully qualified accountant. I currently work at Godfrey Wilson in Bristol, an accountancy practice specialising in charities.

## Interactive talks: Inventing the Eucharist



The last of our series of interactive talks on the theme of “Body, Mind and Spirit” takes place on Thursday 20 July at 7:30pm in the Lower Mews. The topic is “How Jesus Invented the Eucharist”. Revd Professor Bruce Chilton, Biblical

scholar, priest and theologian, will open up the cultural context of Jesus' words *This is my body* and *This is my blood of the covenant*.

What did those words, reportedly said by

Jesus at his final meal with his disciples before his Passion, mean to the people who heard them? How could a society that avoided contact with blood possibly understand that we were to drink his blood? And is that what he meant anyway?

Bruce Chilton, ordained a deacon in New York and a priest at Ely Cathedral, is a scholar of early Christianity and Judaism. He wrote the first critical translation of and commentary on the Aramaic version of Isaiah (*The Isaiah Targum*, 1987), and academic studies analysing the New Testament in its Judaic context (*A Galilean Rabbi and His Bible: Jesus' own interpretation of Isaiah*, 1984; *The Temple of Jesus*, 1992; *Pure Kingdom*, 1997; *Synoptikon: Streams of Tradition in Mark, Matthew, and Luke*, 2023).

# Bishop's Message for July

*What a joy!*

“In response to God’s immense love for us we seek to be God’s people living and telling the story of Jesus.” In conversations with people from around the diocese about our vision in recent months, we have talked of all the different ways that we can serve the communities in which we are based – how we can enable the life of the whole of the people of God.

One of the community connections that many of our churches nurture is with their local school, in particular with our church schools, where day in, day out teachers and their support staff reflect God’s love and teachings with the pupils in their care. As rewarding as that role is, it is a tough one. The long summer holiday may be in sight but anyone who knows a teacher or member of school staff will tell you how

much that is needed as well as how much work is done during that “break”. They truly need our support and love and prayers. We should also give thanks for those working in our schools during the summer, cleaning, building, or preparing for the new academic year.

Not all of us are blessed with the gifts to teach, but many of us have other gifts that can help our school communities. For some it is the gift of storytelling, sharing the teachings of Jesus as an Open the Book volunteer; others serve as chaplains. Some will simply live out their Christian faith by volunteering in classrooms or in the playground or by praying regularly for the school community. All of these roles are valuable to our schools, and rewarding for those who fulfil them.

What our schools and Academy Trusts need in particular are governors and trustees. There are many opportunities, especially for foundation governors and trustees, who have a distinct responsibility for championing the Christian character of our schools [see page 6]. That may sound daunting, but that responsibility isn’t held alone, as there is support locally and from our excellent diocesan education team. And if you do take on that role, what a joy to know that you are playing your part to support and nurture our young people in the way of our Lord, who said, “I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth” (3 John 1:4).

## Face to Face

A new exhibition at the Museum of Bath at Work shows people from 130 years ago, in more than 300 photographs from the 1890s and 1900s. All of them are portraits taken in the studio of Tom Carlyle Leaman, which was at number 7, The Corridor. The photos were made from the original glass plate negatives, which were digitised by the Museum.

The pictures are a real window on the past – the clothes then in fashion, accessories, and the way people styled their hair. Many of the plates have a surname written on the back, and volunteers at the Museum have researched some of them. In the exhibition you can meet Mr David Press, who ran a bakery and confectioners in Broad Street; the girls of the Candy family, whose parents were farmers at Bathampton; Mr Charles Moutrie, the General Manager at Bath Racecourse; and Miss Daisy Fentiman, who worked stitching corsets.

“Face to Face shows us the faces of ordinary people, and gives a snapshot of the kind of jobs they did and where they lived,” says Museum Director Stuart Burroughs. “However, there are many portraits where the person’s identity remains a mystery – come and see if you recognise any names or faces from your own family album!”

## Supporting our schools

In Bath and Wells we are blessed to have 182 Church of England schools. While they each support their children in their own unique way, their values are underpinned by the Church of England’s values of wisdom, hope, community and dignity. Supporting our schools with their own unique talents are our school governors.

Ed Gregory, Director of Education for Bath and Wells, says, “Governors are an essential part of the leadership team in a school or trust. You don’t need to be an expert in education; the strength of a governing board comes from skills and experiences each person brings. While we have some amazingly supportive governors, we also have many gaps to fill, particularly Foundation Governors and Trustees, so if you feel this is something you are called to do, why not find out more about how you could help? It doesn’t take much of your time, we provide lots of support and I have no doubt you will find it extremely rewarding.”

Jayne Rochford-Smith, Headteacher of St Andrew’s Church School in Bath, says, “Governors are what I would call ‘critical friends’. They bring advice, they help us to move the school forward, and they also help us to make the right decisions.”

Foundation Governors are appointed as Governors and as “Champions” for the preservation and development of the religious character of our Church of England schools, a responsibility of the entire Governing Board. They can be from any walk of life and any age over 18, and be a practising Anglican or a member of another Christian denomination within the Churches Together movement. If you’d like to be a governor, even if you don’t have a current church connection, if you have the support of the school and church community and are passionate about ensuring that the religious character of the school is flourishing, we’d still be keen to talk to you, so get in touch.

# About Christ Church

*We're a liberal, inclusive and open church,  
seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty  
in our faith and doubt, and support in our community*

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included: John Moore, the Archbishop of Canterbury; William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery; and Martin Stafford Smith, godfather of John Keble, a founder of the Oxford Movement.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and

organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

For anyone still concerned about the health risks of congregational singing, we do not sing at the 8am BCP Communion or 5pm Quiet Service.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
