From the priest-in-charge...

Revd Lore Chumbley writes:

As I write this there is a pause in hostilities in the Holy Land – not a ceasefire but a brief cessation for the exchange of hostages. I fear that by the time you read this hostilities will have resumed. The killing and destruction of God's chosen people by God's chosen people is an abomination and as it continues there is danger that it will draw more of the countries of the world into the destruction.

All four of my grandparents lived through two world wars and never spoke of it, except that my English grandmother would say with feeling, "I hate waste."

It was surely reckless waste for God to risk the Incarnation. And yet, Christ emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, and allowed himself to be taken hostage and executed by a partnership between religious authorities who believed they were obeying the living God, and Roman authorities representing the epitome of civilisation. Neither group seems to have had much time for the humility, story telling and prayer which the disciples saw in Jesus. *Continued on page 2*

Bishop's Message for December

A unique story



From the Rt Revd Michael Beasley, Bishop of Bath and Wells

When I speak to my Mum on my birthday, she often recalls to me the events that surrounded my arrival in the world. These include nearly being born in the hospital lift, my older brother being smuggled in to see me under my dad's overcoat and of various aunts sneaking onto the maternity ward out of visiting hours by wearing their WRVS uniforms.

Each of us has a unique story about our birth. At Christmas we'll be recounting once again the story that we share about another birth – the birth of Jesus. Across the world we'll be retelling and re-enacting what happened in Bethlehem more than 2,000 years ago. We'll recall the journey of Mary and Joseph, the birth in the stable, the arrival of the shepherds, the song of the angels, the visit of the Magi.

Our own birth stories are unique to each of us. Jesus's is common to us all. And not just because we all know about it. For in our recollection of the birth of Jesus, we'll also be remembering that in him, God came to be at one with us. In Jesus God arrived to share fully in our humanity, experiencing complete solidarity with every aspect of our human condition. Jesus is "God with us" – in trenches in Ukraine, bomb shelters in Israel and Gaza, in hospital wards where loved ones die, in relationships where there is conflict and distress.

Just as much as he is with us in our greatest joys and our deepest woes, Jesus is also for us. One of the earliest teachers of the Church said this: "He became what we are so that we might become what he is." The baby born in Bethlehem stands with us not only in all that we experience. This child also comes to offer us the possibility of opening every part of our lives to the transforming power of God's life of love and joy and peace. He comes so that every day we can become a little more like him.

This is the good news of Christmas, and may it be yours this year.

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About Christ Church

We're a liberal, inclusive and open church, OF ENGLAND seeking God through beauty in our worship, honesty in our faith and doubt, and support in our community

Christ Church has an unusual history, out of which has developed a distinctive ministry. It was founded at the end of the 18th century by a group of socially concerned clergy and lay people for those excluded from worship through the system of pew rents. It was probably the first church in England since the Reformation to provide seating for all free of charge. Early supporters included John Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, and William Wilberforce, the great evangelical and campaigner against slavery. We must recognise, however, that much of Bath's wealth at the time derived, directly or indirectly, from the trafficking and exploitation of enslaved human beings, so that inevitably some of the funds donated ultimately derived from this source.

Christ Church is not a parish church and does not have a full-time vicar. This has led to the development of a shared ministry where clergy and laity both make important contributions to worship and church life.

Christ Church is part of the Anglican diocese of Bath and Wells, although it still sits outside the Church of England parish system. We see ourselves as a traditional and liberal Anglican church. Worship is led by our clergy, and music is provided by our robed choir and organist. New singers of all ages are always very welcome.

As well as worship on Sundays and Thursdays, there are many other activities going on in our community, including our weekly community café every Friday. Our ecumenical Pilgrim Group provides a space for exploration and discussion of faith in an open and non-judgemental setting. Visit the website to check service times and events.
